ITUC open letter: Political inaction on Gaza and Palestine is criminal negligence

Dear Minister Peters,

I am writing to bring your attention to the open letter from the International Trade Union Confederation (ITUC) General Secretary Luc Triangle on the genocide in Gaza (the full letter is appended below). General Secretary Triangle is calling on all governments to take urgent action to end the war in Gaza and the suffering of the Palestinian people.

The ITUC is the international organisation that represents the interests of trade unions around the world. The New Zealand Council of Trade Unions Te Kauae Kaimahi (NZCTU) is one of 342 ITUC-affiliated organisations across 170 countries and territories.

It is now absolutely beyond dispute that Israel is conducting a genocide in Gaza and is deliberately causing starvation to achieve this end. As General Secretary Triangle notes, the genocide being carried out in Gaza is "a crime of historic scale".

All governments have a moral duty to act as forcefully as possible to help bring an end to this crime. General Secretary Triangle calls on governments around the world to implement five key actions:

- 1. Stop all arms deliveries to all parties now
- 2. Ceasefire and unrestricted humanitarian access now
- 3. Release all hostages and political prisoners now
- 4. Recognise Palestine, end occupation and stop trading with illegal settlements now
- 5. Strengthen democracy to deliver peace now

The NZCTU recognises that some of these actions are not directly within New Zealand's power. However, the New Zealand government can show diplomatic leadership by continuously and strongly calling for them. It can also put pressure on Israel to stop its crimes by taking further actions, which we have requested you take in previous correspondence:

- 1. Implement an immediate ban on all imports of goods made in whole or in part in Israel
- 2. Conduct an urgent review of Crown investments and immediately divest from any financial interests in Israeli companies
- 3. Immediately expel the Israeli Ambassador
- 4. Do not participate in any military training exercises, such as future RIMPAC exercises, where the Israeli military is also participating

5. Work with like-minded countries on a coordinated response to increase pressure on Israel to end the conflict

For too long, the international community has allowed the state of Israel to act with impunity. All efforts must be made to put diplomatic and economic pressure on Israel to end its murderous campaign against the people of Palestine. History will judge us harshly if we fail to do so.

An open letter from ITUC General Secretary Luc Triangle: Political inaction on Gaza and Palestine is criminal negligence

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Dear Heads of State, Governments and International Institutions,

The world is witnessing a horror that defies comprehension. Boundaries of humanity have long been crossed, red lines have been trampled. The war in Gaza and the ongoing repression across Palestine must end now.

The Israel-Palestine conflict has endured for generations, but since the heinous terrorist attacks by Hamas on 7 October 2023, we have entered a new and devastating chapter. That attack was an atrocity. However, the collective punishment inflicted on millions of Palestinians in response is a crime of historic scale.

Nearly 22 months into this war, more than 60,000 people are dead, including more than 15,000 children. The 2.1 million Palestinians in Gaza face starvation and indiscriminate bombardment. Three million more in the West Bank suffer daily humiliation, violence and a systematic campaign of land confiscation and settlement expansion.

And yet, apart from strong statements and global protests, the political world remains paralysed, watching this humanitarian catastrophe unfold as if its hands were tied.

This is not diplomacy. This is not neutrality. This is complicity.

Political inaction in the face of these atrocities is nothing less than criminal negligence. The options are many and available within the framework of international law. The international community must act now.

Trade unions from around the world demand immediate and sustained action.

1. Stop all arms deliveries to all parties now

Governments that have armed this conflict in the past or today are co-responsible for the horror. All governments must stop fuelling this war with ever more and heavier weapons. Each bomb, each bullet adds fuel to the fire and empowers extremists to commit war crimes. All indiscriminate bombing and attacks on civilians has to stop.

2. Ceasefire and unrestricted humanitarian access now

Every day, innocent civilians in Gaza are killed or buried under rubble from bombardments as they search for food to survive. In July 2024, I visited the Kerem Shalom crossing from Israel to Gaza. I saw that the infrastructure is right there. It is perfectly equipped to organise the delivery of food and aid to Gaza, and yet it does not happen.

The starvation continues because of political decisions, not logistical limits. Starvation is being used as a weapon of war. Those responsible for such a crime need to face accountability under international law. The international community must demand and enforce an immediate ceasefire and the unhindered delivery of food, water and medical supplies into Gaza. Anything less is complicity.

3. Release all hostages and political prisoners now

Taking civilians hostage is a war crime. I met an Israeli woman who was held captive by Hamas for nearly two months. Her story was harrowing. Many of the hostages were progressive voices, kibbutz residents, peace activists. They are now used as pawns in a brutal game.

At the same time, thousands of Palestinians are detained in Israeli prisons without due process. Most have never seen a judge. Detention without trial, especially on such a mass scale, violates fundamental rights and fuels further radicalisation. Justice must apply equally and to all.

4. Recognise Palestine, end occupation and stop trading with illegal settlements now

A two-state solution has been the agreed path since 1967. But recognition of the State of Palestine must not be a reward at the end of negotiations. It is a precondition at the start of a real peace process. It is increasingly clear that the current Israeli government does not want to live aside an autonomous and independent Palestine.

After destroying Gaza, uprooting its entire population and expanding settlements, what will remain of Palestine once the horror ends? How are we going to resolve and reverse the illegal settlements, the daily aggression of settlers, the intimidation and humiliation of Palestinians in the West Bank and East Jerusalem? Businesses and governments benefiting from trade with the settlements perpetuate their existence.

5. Strengthen democracy to deliver peace now

In the West Bank I witnessed the grim reality of occupation: endless checkpoints, settler violence, and a regime of segregation that evokes the darkest days of South African apartheid. Israel makes it impossible for the Palestinian Authority to govern, and pursue political and economic autonomy. This vacuum is being filled by extremists.

Hamas is a terrorist organisation. The mass murder of 1,200 civilians and the taking of 250 hostages was a crime against humanity. But the Israeli government under Prime Minister Netanyahu has also chosen a path of extremism. The killing of more than 60,000 Gazans, including thousands of children, and the starvation of an entire population is indefensible.

Hamas will not be defeated by Netanyahu. Hamas will be defeated by the Palestinian people, if they are given hope for a free and peaceful future, with decent jobs and social and economic security. In May 2024 in the West Bank I saw firsthand how support for Hamas grows in the shadow of occupation, insecurity, humiliation and poverty.

Palestinians need autonomy. They need rights. They need recognition. Israel rightly demands security guarantees, and that demand must be met. But peace cannot be built on subjugation.

In Israel too, many know this war cannot lead to peace and stability. Brave citizens continue to protest against their government, demanding another path, one based on peace, not

endless war. The current leadership in Israel and Hamas need each other to stay in power. Their war is their strategy for survival.

6. As the ITUC and as trade unions worldwide, we must also act now

We stand in solidarity with our affiliates and other democratic forces in both Palestine and Israel, who continue to advocate for peace and reconciliation amid enormous adversity. We must build bridges between the Israeli Histadrut and the Palestinian PGFTU. We must speak the truth to power and to the people. We must build pressure on business and governments to act. We must push for a reopening of the Israeli labour market to Palestinian workers and respect for their labour rights. We must work for a genuine two-state solution, with a democratic, sovereign and economically viable Palestine living in peace and equality alongside a democratic Israel that respects the rights of all its neighbours.

The war must end now and justice must begin. We all carry responsibility. Inaction is complicity.
